

LIMITED CREDIT PROGRAMME BOATBUILDING FOUNDATION SKILLS (Pre-Apprenticeship)

23 CREDITS Version 3

This Limited Credit Programme (LCP) provides an introduction to the boatbuilding sector of the Marine Industry.

The entry level unit standards are intended to allow apprentices already employed in the Marine Industry to decide if they wish to commit to full boatbuilding apprenticeships.

Employers can use the LCP as a “taster” to see if an employee is suited to undertake a full apprenticeship. If so, unit standards achieved in the LCP count towards completion of the full apprenticeship (National Certificate qualification).

The NZ Marine ITO issues a certificate of achievement to those successfully completing an LCP (non-registered NZQA qualification).

This programme takes on average 6 – 9 months to complete.

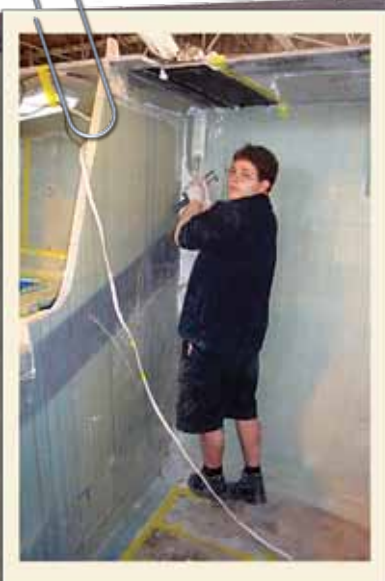
Qualification Pathway Options
